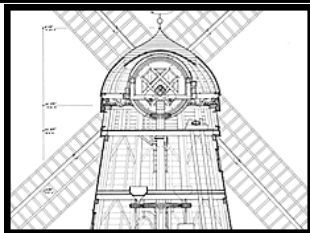


Emergence of Advertising in America

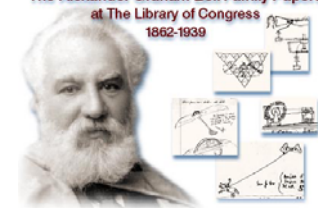
Newspaper Pictorials World War I Rotogravures
